



RFHS TOUR - Wednesday - June 15, 2022, Bee Family Farm & High Plains Historical Museums

The Bee Family Centennial Farm Museum is the historic preservation of an original homestead founded at the start of development of Northern Colorado. It has been maintained as an active family farm since 1894 and is designated a "Centennial Farm" by the State of Colorado Department of Agriculture and the Colorado Historical Society. In 2002, the farm was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

140 acres Of the original 160-acre farm, 140 acres has been placed in a conservation easement and sold to Colorado State University. 10 acres has been retained for the museum site. The historic farm facility is operated as a nonprofit enterprise providing an educational resource for the region to document and celebrate the agricultural history of Larimer County and Northern Colorado. The Farm Museum invites visitors to tour the farm and participate in planned activities surrounding the farm's history and family heritage. Thousands of artifacts including farming equipment, cars, wagons, living necessities, letters, diaries, pictures and the homesteads themselves have been organized and preserved dating back to 1894. Old Nunn Municipal Hall constructed in 1933-1934 as a Civil Works Administration Depression-Era project, the two-story building of painted concrete housed the police station, fire department, and town clerk. Community dinners, school activities, and various other family gatherings took place in the building. No longer used as a town hall, the High Plains Historical Society transformed it into a museum in the year 2000.



PROGRAM "From the Mayflower to the Rockies With Stops in Between" by Brian Carroll Saturday, July 16, 2022, at 1:00 - 3:00



What are the origins of the name for the city of Fort Collins, Colorado? Is the namesake for the city worthy of recognition, and how would he fare when judged relative to truthfulness, fairness, building goodwill, and benefitting others? Brian Carroll will discuss these questions and others about our city's namesake as covered in his recent book, "William O. Collins, From the Mayflower to the Rockies, With Stops In Between."

"William O. Collins, From the Mayflower to the Rockies, With Stops In Between." Brian Carroll has been a resident of Fort Collins since 1996. He retired as a Special Agent with the FBI and moved to Fort Collins after his last assignment in Chicago. Post retirement he established a security consulting firm, provided instruction for the FBI and U.S. State Department in an Anti-Terrorism Program working with countries experiencing terrorist threats, and was an adjunct professor with University of Denver's University College Security Management Program. Brian is a volunteer Master Naturalist with the city, and a volunteer docent with the Fort Collins Museum of Art. Brian lives with his wife Vicki and three daughters and four grandchildren are all Fort Collins residents.

RFHS TOUR - Wednesday - July 20, 2022 Estes Park Museum & Hydro Plant & Stanley House

Estes Park has one of Colorado's longest histories as a destination community, which continues today. From its naming and widespread publicity in the 1864 *Rocky Mountain News* to millions of annual visitors, the allure and enjoyment of Estes Park remains across generations.

Nestled at the foot of iconic Longs Peak, Estes Park's story of Native American tribes, homesteaders, entrepreneurs, and artists is unique to Colorado. With the formation of Rocky Mountain National Park in 1915 and the incorporation of the Town in 1917, Estes Park hosted a number of notable individuals such as Isabella Bird, Enos Mills, Eleanor Hondius, and F.O. Stanley.

The Stanley Home Museum History

The Stanleys' Summer Cottage

Much of the fall and winter of 1903-1904 were given over to planning and constructing the Stanleys' new summer home. The house the Stanleys settled upon was largely designed by F.O. Stanley himself. Its high foundation, imposing front entrance, Greek Doric columns, and classic ornamentation are an unmistakable part of the Federal-inspired Colonial Revival style that graced almost every structure that F.O. and his twin brother ever built. The Stanleys' roomy "cottage," with its 5,240 square feet on three levels, was at once elegant but simple. The second, or main, floor was the largest of the three. It opened off a long, 40-foot veranda and into a large, illuminated front hall. Facing the front door was an impressive and airy central staircase leading to a landing and then continuing up on each side of the rotunda to the third floor above.

F.O. had his private space as well. To the left and slightly below the house, Stanley built a two-story carriage house and workshop. The lower level contained his billiard table, the upper level was the garage and his workshop. Here he would spend time playing his favorite game, making his famous violins and crossbows, or just plain tinkering about.

Clearly the grandest house in Estes Park, the Stanleys' new home in the area called "Rockside," would be enjoyed by Flora and F.O. in the coming 36 years. In its early years, the home was the site where Mr. Stanley's genius would be employed to set the tone for the evolution of modern Estes Park and for the millions of visitors to come.



PROGRAM - Intro to Genealogy - Saturday, August 13 10:30-12:00 By Carol Stetser, Genealogist

If you have ever thought about tracing your family history, this is the presentation for you. Intro to Genealogy will introduce you to various aspects of genealogy such as record keeping, essential documents and online and offline resources. We'll even talk a bit about DNA, one of the biggest game changers in genealogy over the last few years. Carol Stetser is an avid genealogist and a longtime member of LCGS. Over the years, she has served in various positions for the Society including everything from Corresponding Secretary to Vice President. She has taught Intro and Intermediate Genealogy classes for years and is presently volunteering via one-on-one sessions at the Poudre Valley District Library. One of her favorite parts of genealogy is helping folks learn to delve into their own family history.

Nici Self Historical Museum & Grand Encampment Museum



The Centennial Depot, also known as the Nici Self Historical Museum, was built in 1907 for the Laramie, Hahns Peak and Pacific Railway in Centennial, Wyoming, United States. In addition to railroad services, the depot housed a post office and, at times, a grocery store. The depot was operated by the Union Pacific Railroad until the early 1970s. Demolition was proposed, but the depot was purchased by the Centennial Valley Historical Association, which moved it a short distance to its present site. It is operated as the Nici Self Museum.


The Grand Encampment Museum is the "GEM" of Southern Wyoming. It is located in Encampment, Wyoming. The GEM has a rich collection of over a dozen historical buildings filled with artifacts representing the timber, mining, and agricultural history of the Encampment valley at the turn of the 20th century.
