The Worleys and their friends from Holyoke and people from Nebraska who succumbed to the high-pressure salesmanship, set about arranging their cabins for summer pleasure and enjoying the natural advantages of the region. They accepted the rustic character with the lack of electricity and other conveniences. But the company, pledged to develop the community and provide so many amenities of civilization, was soon in trouble. Everything was more expensive than anyone had planned, and road construction costs particularly were unpredictable. There were many revisions and new incorporations so the number of companies between 1923 and 1929 is almost as complicated a chain as the ditch and reservoir companies of the period after 1900. Each one tried to salvage something from the predecessors. The Red Feather Investment Company incorporated by Morris Swedlow in January 1928 was particularly ambitious and did accomplish much, though the financial arrangements were no better than the others.

The flurry of 1928 building was reported in the columns of the Fort Collins paper and the chatty tidbits suggested that things were moving along well:

- April 6: Mr. Link, contractor, was hauling large loads of furniture to Red Feather Lakes. April 11: Lou Young brought Mr. McCoullagh of the fox farm to town. A.E. Ball had a contract to build new roads.
- April 18: There are many Larimer County citizens who have not lost faith in Red Feather and believe it can be made into one of the greatest of western play grounds.
- May 1: A.E. Ball is excavating for the new club house. Eli Cooley is working for him, down to Fort Collins for a load of hay and grain. Lou Young busy hunting for some of his saddle horses. Abe Akin repairing fences around the state fish hatchery. Clarence Miller hauling wood for the fox farm. Lumber is pouring in by truck load to Red Feather.
- May 28: The fish hatchery is being built. Work on the golf course is progressing. The installation of large playground equipment has been completed and camping ground is ready for tourists. Two hundred and fifty cottages had been built and twenty-four tourist cabins are under construction including coverage for motor cars.
- July 1: Cattlemen are riding into Red Feather gathering cattle to take to Deadman summer range. All had a big supper at Lou Young's.
- July 17: The Clubhouse was opened with a big dance. The orchestra was Twilight Entertainers ... Morris Swedlow was amazing people with his progress.  
The Clubhouse lawn had been seeded. Abe Akin was running water from Ramona into Snake so work on the road can be completed.
